Lorraine Finley Honored with Award

Former resident Lorraine Finley was presented the Community Service Award at the May 21 annual meeting of the Walworth Historical Society in recognition of her volunteer work during the 1960's and 1970's in Walworth and Wayne County. In presenting the plaque to Lorraine, President Jessie Keymel noted the key role the honoree played in the establishment of the Walworth Reading Room and the Walworth-Seely Public Library. May 21 was officially declared Lorraine Finley Day in Walworth by the Walworth Town Board, according to a proclamation read by Suzi Hawkins-Mance, Walworth Town Board Councilman.

Mary Zingerella, WSPL Library Director, reminisced about Lorraine's visit to the library earlier in the day and her amazement at the growth of the library since receiving its charter in 1962. Mary noted Lorraine was the first president of the Wayne County Library System, predecessor of Pioneer Library System, and read a congratulatory letter from PLS Director Jennifer Morris.

A thank you letter from the WSPL Library Board was read by Board President Ellen Dietterick. Town Historian Gene Bavis reminisced about Lorraine's tenure on the Wayne Central School Board and noted the rapid growth period experienced by the school system during that time.

Lyle Bassage spoke of Lorraine and her husband Joe's high regard for education, referring to the scholarship fund they established in 1992 for Walworth students. As of June 2007, 52 scholarships have been awarded and approximately 240 students have applied (see story on page 6).

Family friend Richard Roland shared a scrapbook of memories of Lorraine and her late husband, Joe. Richard proudly introduced his granddaughter, Kaitlyn Scott, who modeled the gown Lorraine wore when she and Joe attended the 1962 inauguration ball for Governor Nelson Rockefeller. Tidbits from the Scrapbook of Anna MayBy Joyce Finney

March 1941.....100 students at Walworth High School protest the resignation of their band instructor, Mrs. Theron Forbes. They marched through the school corridors and the streets carrying signs. School was closed for two days as students protested. The reason for the protest was an unsettled dispute over whether she should receive \$50 additional yearly salary. She only received a \$25 a year increase and all other eligible teachers received a \$75 raise.

July 1945.....New York City......13 killed, 20 hurt when an Army B-29 crashes into the Empire State Building hitting the 79th floor during heavy fog. Police said death toll might exceed 15. Scores of people were injured.

April 19, 1947... Edward Lonneville and Geraldine Reynolds were married at the Walworth Methodist Church. Also on the same day Clarence Seavert and Janet Kaper were married.

August 1947....Old Home Day was celebrated by Baptist congregation in Walworth. There was a parade with floats, decorated bicycles and doll carriages. Also a concert by the Walworth band and music by Charles Pembroke and His Hillbillies. A pageant was presented depicting history of the church.

June 1961.....The main business section of Walworth was threatened with serious fire loss as firemen battled a roof blaze in the Walworth Grange Hall building that also housed the Post Office and a feed and grain store, barber shop and apartment. Estimated damage was about \$2,000.

A Tribute to Irma: The History of Bills Road (Part 1 of 2)

Prior to her passing last year, Irma (Barmaster) Wyse and her friend Mary Jane Devlin enjoyed memorable times together. Their conversations frequently included memories of West Walworth and Bills Road, resulting in this list of former and current residents. Irma lived on Bills Road her entire life except for a short period of time.

Additional information was compiled with help from long-time residents Norman Druschel and Inez (Welker) Ikewood and many others. Our thanks to everyone who helped. If you have memories of Bills Road that you would like to add to this file, please contact anyone listed on the front of this newsletter.

<u>Note:</u> In the early 1970's the numbering system was changed. The first number is the old number and the second number is the new address. If there is only one number, the house was built after the new numbering system started.

Four Students Receive Finley Scholarships By Lyle Bassage

Joe and Lorraine Finley together made a wonderful team. They both loved Walworth and served their community unselfishly. The results of their numerous endeavors will surely benefit their hometown for years to come. They both valued education and thus created the Joseph and Lorraine Finley Scholarship Fund. It was created in 1992 for the purpose of helping Walworth residents who desired to pursue their education beyond high school. Working cooperatively with the Rochester Area Community Foundation, 52 awards have been made to this date. In recent years, four such awards have been made annually.

Jay Taber, Gordon Youngman, and Bernie Porray comprised the first scholarship committee. Gordon remains on the committee and shares the selection process with Kathy Emison and myself. Their discussions and approved process led to the selection of four high school seniors who will attend a school of higher learning this fall. Jacob Keymel, Jamie Boerman, Jenna Boerman, and Amy Sansone are the recipients for 2007 and will each receive \$1,250 to be used towards college expenses next year. We all wish them well in their future educational experiences.

Jacob will be attending Finger Lakes Community College in Canandaigua. Jamie and Jenna have both been accepted at four-year universities in the Buffalo area. St. John Fisher College will be Amy's new home when the fall semester begins. We must all be thankful to the Finleys and their generous support to students desiring an education. In reality, once the inquiring minds of students have been fulfilled we will all benefit. Both Joe and Lorraine possessed the wisdom to understand the importance of this fundamental concept.

Genealogist Position Filled By Gene Bavis

We are pleased to announce that Joyce Hyman Smith has agreed to accept the position of Genealogist with the Walworth Historical Society. If you recall, we posted a help wanted notice in the last issue of the <u>WHS</u> <u>News</u> asking for someone who would be willing to help us organize and maintain our genealogical records.

Of the many calls or e-mails we get, genealogy-related questions are the most common. Joyce will begin by reviewing what is currently in our files and create an index for it. Then we hope to expand the index to give the locations of other known information. For example, we know that the Wayne County Historian's office has over 400 genealogies that are quite extensive as well as about 8,000 family files with bits and pieces of information. We are sure that some of those files are Walworth-related, so we hope to include their information in our index. Other neighboring historians and historical societies probably have information too.

When someone contacts us, we can say that "so and so" also has a file that may include some information on your family. If you have a family history in any form (complete or in various stages of development), we'd like to include YOU in our index, especially if it's Walworth related.

Our mission is to assist researchers in any way that we can, so even if we don't have anything in our files, it's nice to be able to tell them where they might find information. In the long run we all benefit. Of course, if you do have a genealogy that you'd like to share with us or pictures of Walworth residents, we would love to have them. A long term goal will be to get as much in electronic format as possible so that we can send it via email. We also want to work with other groups to develop a more comprehensive index. Welcome, Joyce, and thanks to all of you for supporting the WHS.
