One of the projects we have been working on is using a recent \$600 grant from the Hoffman Foundation to transfer many of Charlie Pembroke's 8 mm movies that pertain to the people and town of Walworth into a DVD format. There are many more movies than can be converted but, because a committee reviewed these movies for quality and content a few years ago, it was easy to select some of the best ones. Already a first installment of movies has been converted. A second group of films has been sent for conversion and should be finished by the time this newsletter is published. This will account for about 95% of the ones that will be converted. The last ones will be finished by mid-August. Once that is accomplished, we hope to show them at a future WHS meeting.

May 17 Meeting - Quilts for Kids By Bob Mogray

Lots of things were going on at the annual May meeting of the WHS held at the new Lodge at Ginegaw Park. This is a great place to hold a meeting with plenty of room and a great atmosphere. As expected, this meeting was very well attended. Following a pot-luck meal, WHS president Jessie Keymel called everyone to order for a short business meeting. The minutes from the last meeting were read as was the treasurer's report. The next business of the evening was the election of officers. Becky Appleman and Gene Bavis were re-elected for 3-year terms as board members; president Jessie Keymel, vice president Bob Mogray, and secretary Judy McMillan were re-elected to one-year terms.

The main part of the evening consisted of the WHS presentation of its yearly Community Service Award - this year to the group known as Quilts for Kids. This is a very deserving group of dedicated people. Founders Kim Valone and Linda Saxton were present to accept this award for their group. Several other members of the group were also in attendance, as well as members of the Zion West Walworth United Methodist Church which sponsors this ministry.

The idea for Quilts for Kids came to Kim Valone in 2004 when she read an article in <u>Family Circle</u> magazine about how children in other countries were having operations to repair cleft palates. Because these countries were so poor, the kids were sent home wrapped in plastic or newspapers. Kim knew how much better it would be for these children if they could have quilts and blankets instead. So, with little or no quilting experience, she decided to make quilts for these kids and to work with Rotoplast International to ship and distribute the quilts to foreign hospitals.

Linda Saxton has been a friend of Kim's for many years and had some quilting experience. She was looking for a service project and readily joined Kim with her quilting. Soon there were others. Currently there are about a dozen core members in her group of quilters. They not only make quilts but also place settings, table runners, and some custom work in order to fund their project. These quilts and blankets go not only to cleft palate surgery patients but also to some burn victims. Their main passion, however, is still making the quilts for kids, hence the name. To date, they have made over 450 quilts of all sizes, colors, and patterns and have sent them to hospitals in South America, Africa, and Asia.

At the meeting on May 17, Kim and Linda presented a slide show of their quilts and showed photos of some of the children after operations, wrapped in the quilts made by the group. Kim told the history of the group as well. Kim Valone and Linda Saxton, as well as some of the Quilts for Kids members, are shown in the photo below.

One item that came out at the meeting was that for most of these poor families in other countries the quilt these kids bring home from the hospital is the only blanket they have in their homes. Many times these blankets are washed in a river and hung outdoors to dry. Kim, Linda, and their Quilts for Kids group deserve everyone's respect for performing this valuable service. They are very dedicated to their cause and work very hard at it. They depend on material (100% cotton with bright colors) and money donated to them to continue their work. January: Postage on letters to go up to 27 cents.

<u>January</u>: Chunks of the Berlin Wall sell for \$30,000. Western buyers are paying nearly \$30,000 for large segments of the Wall, an East German newspaper reported.

<u>February 6</u>: Clifford Huntley dies at age 95. He was a retired farmer and Past Master of the Walworth Lodge.

April: The First Baptist Church of West Walworth announces the installation of Sharon M. Wheeler as their new pastor.

<u>April 27</u>: A new tree grows in Yeomans Park. Den 3 of Cub Scout Pack 113, under the leadership of Vaughn Pembroke, presented to the WHS a Kwanzan flowering cherry tree which they planted in the yard in front of the museum.

May: Charlie Bills retires from Wayne Central School. He taught at Wayne Central for 22 years.

<u>August</u>: Walworth native Cory English is making it big in the Big Apple. A former student of Sandy Stramonine School of Dance in West Walworth, he has just been signed to the permanent cast of the Broadway musical "Gypsie" staring Tyne Daly. Cory is the son of Fay and Vernon English.

September: The First Baptist Church of West Walworth celebrates 175 year anniversary.

Court Docket Book On Loan to Museum

A Town of Walworth Court Docket Book, dating from 1860 – 1899, was recently discovered in the archives at the town hall by Town Justice Terence Wolfe. At their May 6 meeting, members of the Walworth Town Board agreed the book should be made available to the public and authorized it to be on permanent loan to the Walworth Historical Society. Listed in the book are three judges with the last name of Peacock: Joseph, Fred, and J. R. Justice Wolfe visited the museum last month and presented the book to Jessie Keymel, WHS president.

The Story of a Home-Town Grocery Store By Dorothy French

Local family-owned grocery stores are now almost non-existent. Many of them have been replaced by the big box discount and supermarket chain stores.



At various times Walworth was home to grocery stores where hometown friendliness and good service were the hallmark of a successful business. This is the story of Triou's IGA Store, operated by the husband and wife team of Howard and Ethel from 1943 to 1951.

Located at 3697 Main Street, the store offered meats, groceries and vegetables to customers from the surrounding towns. Howard remembers selling ice cream cones and soda for \$.05 cents, newspapers \$.03, large box of cereal \$.29, pound of hamburger \$.19, and a gallon of gas \$.17. He commented that "on a good week we would do \$3,000 business, which would be about \$35,000 today." Howard said good clerks earned \$.90 an hour then.

The Trious purchased the store from Joe Finley and sold it in 1952 to Don Brockman and Bud Ennis.

<u>Triou's IGA Store 1943 – 1951</u>. The small building at the left was an antique shop operated by Elton May. Both buildings were demolished August 2, 1968, to make way for the Masonic Hall. In October 2002 the Masons sold their building; today it is known as the Baptist Community Center.

Festival in the Park By Mary Jane Devlin
